All exhibitors in the junior fair division shall be members of 4-H, FFA, FHA-HERO, Scouting programs, breed groups, or any other recognized youth organization under the adult leadership and with an education program approved by the local fair.

Required YQCA for Beef, Dairy, Goat, Poultry, Rabbit, Sheep and Swine projects. Starting fall of 2017 Wisconsin replaced the MAQA (meat animal quality assurance program) with the YQCA (youth for the quality care of animals), a national program. This new and interactive program provides a number of options for an annual quality assurance certification for youth.

COPY OF SECTION-4571: "Any person who shall willfully & without right to enter any agricultural fairgrounds, which are duly enclosed with a fence no less than 6 feet high, during any Fair exhibition by climbing over or passing through or under such fence or by using the ticket or badge if some other person or any other way, shall be punished with a fine not exceeding fifty (\$50.00) dollars."

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INFORMATION FOR JUNIOR FAIR EXHIBITORS

Junior Fair Participants: All exhibitors in the junior fair division shall be members of 4-H, FFA, FHA-HERO, Scouting programs, breed groups, or any other recognized youth organization under the adult leadership and with an education program approved by the local fair.

Junior Fair Entries

Online Entry: Online entries are available online at <http://adams.uwex.edu>, at the UW-Extension Office or on the fair website <https://www.co.adams.wi.us/> (Recreation).

Entry Tags: Tags will be available to be picked up by the exhibitor/family at the Fairgrounds Clean-up held prior to the fair. This provides ample time to review the exhibit tags and ensure accuracy. Tag corrections will be accepted up to time of check-in. Any errors must be corrected at this time. This ensures that the judges sheets are correct. Tags will **NOT** be printed for animal departments except for poultry & rabbits.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR COMPLETING ENTRY Go Online: Check carefully all regulations concerning exhibits such as size, age and number.

JUNIOR FAIR EXHIBITOR INFO All Junior fair exhibits entered must be the result of the labor of the person exhibiting, and must have been made, grown, or produced since the last fair except as noted in the premium list.

One exhibitor in any lot number may make only one entry. **The same animal cannot be shown in both Open Class and Junior Fair.** Animals entered in group class shall be exhibited in a class for individuals.

NON-ANIMAL ENTRY JUDGING INFO

Exhibit Building Judging Tips.

Lines can be long so have patience

Bring a box or wagon to put your exhibits in to save trips back and forth to the car.

All articles must be tagged and entered in the proper departments, department superintendents and helpers will receive exhibits and place articles on display once it has been judged. Times for judging of fair week, in the Exhibit building will be posted on the website <https://www.co.adams.wi.us/> (Recreation)

No loaded or primed cases or firearms or ammunition can be brought as fair projects

If exhibitor is not present for face-to-face judging in the exhibit building, the exhibit will be lowered one-placing.

ANIMAL ENTRY INFO

Livestock exhibitors should check with the Barn

Superintendent for assigned space.

Livestock exhibitors must submit their livestock for examination for contagious disease by the official veterinarian in accordance with state guidelines/regulations (see current Wisconsin Fair ANIMAL HEALTH RULES AND REGULATIONS). Animals that require this verification cannot be unloaded until approval is granted.

Premise ID required for all livestock, poultry and rabbits. Register online at www.wiid.org, phone WLIC at 888-808-1910, or use paper forms available from DATCP or WLIC.

Vet Rule - If anybody suspects the health of an animal is questionable, the county fair veterinarian shall be contacted, and their decision is final.

All exhibitors must comply with sanitary and animal health requirements.

Horses, dogs, cats, small pets, and exotic animals cannot be kept at the fairgrounds. They are to be brought only for judging.

Showmanship: Youth entered in showmanship must show in a breeding or market class.

RELEASE OF EXHIBITS

Exhibits including decorations are to remain in place until 4:00 p.m. on Sunday of Fair week. Failure to do so will result in loss of premium.

Youth should bring tag receipts to verify their projects ownership.

Baked goods and garden entries become the property of the Fair and are destroyed at the end of Fair.

After exhibits are released, booths must be dismantled, and the booth area left neat by the group that made the booth. All staples must be removed.

ALL ARTICLES NOT COLLECTED ON SUNDAY (LAST DAY OF FAIR) FROM 4PM TO 6PM WILL BECOME PROPERTY OF ADAMS COUNTY FAIR.

GENERAL INFORMATION

The officers of the Adams County Agricultural Society will take every precaution in their power for the safe preservation of stock and other exhibits but will not be responsible for loss or damage that may occur.

1. The general supervision of the grounds and the entire exhibition at each and every annual Fair is vested in the Secretary of the Society. Exhibitors and others desirous of special privileges not granted in the published regulations must apply to him or her and all laborers on the grounds must be employed by his or her consent and subject to her direction.
2. Officers of the Society authorize the letting of such privileges or concessions as are required to supply the necessary wants of the people or that may add to their comfort, convenience, and pleasure; but under no condition will privileges of a questionable nature or of demoralizing tendency be let or in any manner be tolerated

upon the grounds or in the buildings, nor will any privileges be permitted where the business is conducted in other than a legitimate and trade-like manner. The sale of alcoholic liquors and games of chance are strictly prohibited. Any violation of this rule will be severely dealt with.

3. Purchasers of privileges must keep their spaces in a sanitary condition by removing therefore all filth and refuse and by placing same in garbage cans provided.
4. Concessionaires and their employees and workers in food Stands must be neat and tidy in their dress. Persons found working at any privileges and not complying with this section may be ordered off the grounds.
5. The officers reserve the right to exclude from the grounds any person or persons who shall violate any part of the rules made by the officers of the Society.
6. Commercial exhibitors desiring booth space should apply to the Adams County Fair Treasurer, P.O. Box 380, Friendship, WI 53934 for information.
7. No dormitory facilities are available. Camping privileges may be requested from the Fair Board.
8. Milk produced at the Fair must be dumped.
9. The Fairgrounds are county owned and are a **NON-SMOKING** Premise.
10. Due to lack of State Funding the Adams County Agricultural Society reserves the right to revise dollar premiums amounts in any given fair year.
11. No one will be allowed in or around the barns between 11:00 P.M. and 7:00 A.M. without being an exhibitor.
12. Manure is to be put only in the designated area. Please be responsible for the cleanliness of your area.

STATE, COUNTY, DISTRICT ANIMAL HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL ANIMALS. Exhibitors at County and District fairs are required to comply with all of the statutory and regulatory provisions of the State of Wisconsin relating to animal health.

All exhibitors must comply with the provisions set forth below. If a fair or livestock exhibition in this state last for more than 24 hours, the sponsors of the fair or exhibition shall appoint a licensed veterinarian to conduct daily inspections of all livestock at the fair or exhibition. The appointed veterinarian shall also review all records and test results required in these fair requirements. If a fair or exhibition lasts less than 12 hours, all records and test results required by these requirements shall be reviewed by a licensed veterinarian or by the show chairperson. The attending veterinarian shall conduct such test and examinations as may be necessary to determine the disease status of any animal and shall exclude or cause the removal of any animal afflicted with or suspected of being afflicted with any contagious, infectious, or communicable disease.

HEALTH RECORDS

Persons exhibiting livestock at any fair or livestock exhibition in Wisconsin shall have a copy of the required health certificate or certificate of veterinary inspection available for inspection by the department at the fair or livestock exhibition or file a copy of such certificates at the show or fair office for the duration of the exhibit. A health certificate or certificate of veterinary inspection is valid for 30 days unless extended by species.

PARASITES

Cattle infected with mange, scab, or ringworm may not be exhibited at any fair or other livestock exhibition. Animals found to be infected or show evidence of infection shall be isolated from other animals susceptible to the disease and removed from the premises. This shall not apply to animals showing evidence of ringworm infection in the opinion of the attending veterinarian of such fair or exhibition; the lesion is inactive and not capable of transmitting the disease.

WARTS

Bovine animals infected with warts may not be exhibited at livestock exhibitions. Animals with evidence of wart infection will be examined by the fair veterinarian and the animal ordered removed from the premises unless the veterinarian finds the warts are not capable of transmitting the disease.

QUARANTINE

LIVESTOCK UNDER QUARANTINE by the Department are not eligible for exhibition.

PENALTIES

Section 95.19 of the Wisconsin Statutes provides in part: "No person shall... exhibit at any fair any animal afflicted with or exposed to any contagious or infectious disease". It is a misdemeanor to exhibit animals contrary to this section. In addition, it is provided that any person violating this provision shall be liable to any other person who sustains damage by reason of such violation.

Department 1 – Dairy
MILKING COWS: Exhibitors are responsible for providing a portable milking machine to milk any cattle that are brought to the fair. The exhibitor is responsible for milking and properly disposing of any milk.

Cattle Rules:

- *All exhibitors must follow health regulations and barn rules.*
- *All calves must be at least 4 months old at the time of exhibit. Senior Yearling heifers that have freshened should be entered as 2 year olds.*
- *All bull calves must have proof of breed registration.*

Definition of Classes

Winter Calf—Born between December 1 of year preceding exhibit year, and Feb. 28th or Feb. 29th of exhibit year.

Fall Calf—Born between September 1 and November 30 of year preceding exhibit year.

Summer Yearling—Born between June 1 and August 31 of year preceding exhibit year.

Spring Yearling—Born between March 1 and May 31 of year preceding exhibit year.

Winter Yearling—Born between December 1 of the 2nd year preceding exhibit year and February 28 or 29 of year preceding exhibit year.

Fall Yearling—Born between September 1 and November 30 of the 2nd year preceding exhibit year.

2 Year Olds—Born between September 1 of the 3rd year preceding exhibit and August 31 of the 2nd year preceding exhibit year, and shall include yearlings, which have freshened.

3 Year Olds—Born between September 1 of the 4th preceding exhibit year and August 31 of 3rd year preceding exhibit.

4 Year Olds—Born between September 1 of the 5th year preceding exhibit year and August 31 of the 4th year preceding exhibit.

Dry Cow—3 years and older, must have milked 280 days or more since last Fair. DHIA records to be used as proof.

HEALTH RULES: *All exhibitors must follow health regulations and barn rules.*

Definition of Age Classes:

Junior Calf—Born on or after January 1st of exhibit year. The calf must be 4 months old at time of exhibit to be shown.

Senior Calf—Born between September 1 and December 31 of year preceding exhibit year.

Summer Yearling—Born between May 1 and August 31 of year preceding exhibit year

Junior Yearling—Born between Jan 1 and April 30 of year preceding exhibit year.

Senior Yearling—Born between September 1 and December 1 of the second year preceding exhibit year.

2. To be eligible for the market beef class, a beef animal must weigh a minimum of 1000 lbs. and dairy beef animals must weigh a minimum of 1050 lbs.
3. An Exhibitor may show 2 market animals and a feeder calf.
4. 7. If an exhibitor has 2 market animals that land in the same weight class, the exhibitor may choose to bump 1 animal to the next higher weight class if available.
5. Minimum weight for Low-line market animals to be in a market class must be at least 650 pounds at fair. Exhibitors must provide documentation of the registration papers that the animal is a low-line beef or beef/dairy animal to be eligible for this category.

Department 3 – Swine

Adams County Fair is A TERMINAL SWINE SHOW. All swine exhibited at the fair must go directly to slaughter, and a record of where they went must be provided.

HEALTH RULES: *All exhibitors must follow health regulations and barn rules.*

Veterinarian health check papers, original and a copy, must be provided before unloading Swine.

- Scrapie tag must be in place before Fair and a list provided to the Fair Secretary.
- All breeds shall show with two inches of wool or less.
- Breeding Stock cannot be shown in Market Classes also.

Department 6 – Horse & Pony

PART 1-RULES AND REGULATIONS:

- A. The age of the horse is determined as of January 1st of current year. A junior horse is 5 years old or younger and may be shown in a bosal, snaffle or curb bit. A senior horse is 6 years old and older and can only be shown in a curb for western, snaffle or curb for Hunt Seat or Saddle.
- B. All horses must have a current year Coggins (original and copy) and proof of 4-way B. All horses must have a current year Coggins
- C. An exhibitor may show a maximum of two animals at the Fair.
- D. No stallions will be allowed to show.
- E. If a horse/ponies' health is questionable, the show judge's decision will be final unless the judge feels it is out of his realm of knowledge

a veterinarian will then be called. The horse's owner and or handler/rider will be responsible for all veterinarian expenses.

- F. The area around the horse trailers must be cleaned and holes filled in before leaving the grounds. A \$5.00 deposit per rider clean up fee will be collected at registration on the date of the event. At the conclusion of the event, the \$5.00 deposit will be refunded upon approval of a current board member. If the area is vacated prior to approval, the deposit will be surrendered to the hosting club.
- G. Best of Show and Reserve will be given at the judge's discretion. The judge shall have the guidelines containing but not limited to: Rider Presentation, Sportsmanship, Animal presentation (condition and grooming)
- H. All exhibitors must display their entry number AT ALL TIMES while on the fairgrounds.
- I. All horses must be supervised AT ALL TIMES.

PART 2-SAFETY:

- A. Proper boots or hard soles shoes with ½ inch heel are required to be worn at all times when mounted or driving. 4-H members are required to wear a SEI safety helmet with chin strap when mounted and/or driving.

PART 3-DEFINITIONS:

- A. SHOWMANSHIP- Judged on the exhibitor's ability to show animal in hand.
- B. HORSEMANSHIP/EQUITATION- Judged on the exhibitor's ability to ride under saddle.
- C. PLEASURE- Judged on the horse/pony's performance under saddle or driving.
- D. HORSELESS HORSE- Is a 4-H only class for members and is designed to help allow kids who don't have an animal of their own a chance to participate in the horse project with minimal financial obligation. They share a horse with another 4-H member and participate in showmanship and walk-trot classes only.
- E. PONY- To be measured at 56" or less prior to showing at the fair by an Executive of the Horse & Pony Board.

PART 4-CLASSES:

- A. Classes will be run in posted order. If you have a tack change, the gate person needs to be notified. Exhibitors must be ready to enter the gate when the class is called.
- B. If patterns are required, they will be posted 1 hour before the start of the show/class.
